TV Interviews

The red carpet was actually pink to match the movie's theme. The carpet was flanked by hundreds of TV and newspaper reporters from around the world. Behind them were thousands of screaming fans. Hanna approached several reporters and introduced herself. Once they realized, she had a significant part in the movie, the on-camera interviews started with several network and cable stations, including a Chinese station. The autographs started shortly thereafter. The first was for Chad Michael Murray's father who had arrived just after we did.

"After the big stars arrived and gave their interviews, we all entered the theater; the movie started about 4:15. This was the second time we had seen it but it was no less exciting. Trying to correct for our obvious bias, we think this is a wonderful movie with deep symbolism that all should enjoy.

"Following the movie, more and more people recognized Hannah for her contribution and her talent. She was given praise by several Hollywood bigwigs and well as several cast and crew members who had seen the movie for the first time. Several more autographs and photos followed outside on the pink carpet.

The Premiere Party

"The premiere party was just a short walk down Hollywood Blvd. at the Highland Complex. Buffet tables, an open bar and all the celebrates were there. Hannah enjoyed the kid activity tables while Jane and I spent time with the director and

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his wife, the producers and the parents of Chad and his fiance, Sophia. The party was divided into the VIP section and the main section. Not realizing we were invited into the VIP section (a respite from the continuous autograph and picture requests), we spent most of our time in the main section. When Hannah finally decided to stay hello to Hilary and Chad, the red ropes fell away as she approached them. Unfortunately, Hilary had already left, but she enjoyed seeing Chad. She presented the director (Mark Rosman) and her movie dad (Whip Hubley) with thank you notes; she gave a thank you note to Hilary's bodyguard, who promised to delivery it to Hilary.

Exciting Times to Come

"By nine p.m. the party was over and we were on our way home from the ball. Hannah couldn't have handled all this attention and excitement any better, and we couldn't have been more proud of her. With the premiere over, the most exciting times are ahead."

For What CMA Did For Me, I Will Be Forever Grateful

It was 1935. We were still in the throes of the great depression. Things were tough. I had just finished my freshman year in high school, having failed three subjects. Not to worry, I would get out sooner or later and my dad would get me a job with the company he worked for as he had done for my older sister and brother when they finished school. I had just started my sophomore year when my dad died.

I finished my sophomore year with two more failed subjects. It then began to dawn on me that my dad was gone and I was on my own. I was leafing through a magazine at the barber shop one afternoon when I came across an ad for CMA. I sent off for a catalog. When it came, I showed it to my mother and told her that this was where I thought I ought to be. She thought so too but didn't think we could afford it.

Bugler Scholarship

Major Fishbum showed up at the house one day and we talked CMA. He offered me a scholarship to bugle and play in the band and put me on to a guy who had just graduated and wanted to sell his uniforms. By buying used uniforms and renting out our house, I was able to attend CMA. Mother rented a room with some friends of hers.

I struggled through my junior year grade wise, and if memory serves me, accumulated over a hundred and thirty demerits. I didn't see much of downtown on weekends.

Before I went to CMA, I went to summer school and made up three of the subjects that I had failed and made up the other two the next summer. In my senior year, my final exam grades were: Algebra - IOO, Physics - 99, Spanish - 97, and English - 90. I also received special mention at graduation for having <u>NO</u> demerits. Some people do learn.

But I was not through with CMA. I had heard that the contacts you made in college were worth more than what you learned. I thought that if this were true, why wouldn't it work the same with CMA?

Good Jobs Were Scarce

In the year following graduation from CMA I, couldn't find a decent job with any future. I went back to CMA for the 1940 graduation, slept on the floor in one of my buddies room and talked with some guys about their dads helping me get a decent job.

I had several offers of help and went home with Charles Burke to Anderson, Indiana where his dad was president of Guide Lamp, a subsidiary of General Motors,

His dad said he could put me on at Guide Lamp but that General Motors had just opened a new plant in Indianapolis making in-line engines for the Lockheed P-38 and Bell Aircobras and I may have a better chance for advancement down there.

Allison Engineering

I went to work for Allison Engineering in Indianapolis two days later.

So CMA not only gave me a good education and taught me a lot of other things but also got me my first real job and I will be forever grateful to the school, the faculty, and the cadet corps.

Following thirty nine years of military service, Sefton retired from the


