What Football Coach Said, "Winning Isn't Everything, It's the Only Thing!"

If you said Vince Lombardi you would be wrong. Vince said something similar but it was another football great, Coach Henry R. "Red" Sanders (1905-1958), who coached the CMA Bulldogs from 1930 to 1934 who first uttered those words according to Scoop Hudgins, Vanderbilt's sports information director from 1946 to 1948 and Fred Russell, retired sports editor of the Nashville Banner. It was Russell who quoted Sanders in one of his newspaper columns at the time.

Captain Sanders

Captain H.R. Sanders, his title at CMA, came to the school from a coaching job at Clemson following an outstanding collegiate career as quarter-back at Vanderbilt University from 1923 to 1926 under Daniel Earle McGugin. Sanders also played second base for the old Mobile Bears baseball club in Mobile, AL before moving to Columbia in 1930.

Dick Hall, Class of '34, remembers Captain Sanders well during the four years he played football under him. "He was head coach and an instructor in Junior School," relates Hall, a retired executive now living in Texas. "He had a reputation for discipline, hard work and fairness that carried him to the National Collegiate Championship in 1954 with a perfect 9-0 record as head coach at

U.C.L.A.," relates Hall. "My years at CMA were probably the most important of my youth as my time helped mold the character I carried through life." He remembers that CMA got a lot of publicity during Sanders stay, which included a lot of national attention among private schools.

Hall carried fond memories of CMA as an Infantry Rifleman with the 96th Division to both Leyte and Okinawa during WWII's Pacific Campaign. "God was good to me. I got through both battles without a scratch."

Sanders started his coaching career in 1928 as an assistant coach at

The Tennessee Technology Center at Oneida/Huntsville, TN, dedicated its new administration building to long time state Senator George Alvin Terry, Class of '44. Clemson before moving to Columbia. Following his four years at CMA he became head coach at Vanderbilt. He left to join the Army in WWII, returning as head coach for the Commodores from 1946 to 1948. While at Vanderbilt he had an assistant coach which was later acclaimed "Alabama's Best", Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant (see picture on page 2).

Captain Sanders

He left the Black and Gold to become head coach at U.C.L.A. Sanders coached the Bruins from 1949 to 1957. He was arguably the best coach in school history, having compiled a record of 66-19-1 (.773) at UCLA and earning the school its only football national championship in 1954. As head coach of the Bruins, Sanders took them to three Pacific Coast Conference (PCC) titles, two Rose Bowls ('54 and '56 seasons) and was selected AFCA Coach of the Year in 1954.

It reads: Columbia Military Academy Alumni Association of Maury, County, Tennessee, was organized to commemorate the lasting contributions made by the Academy (1904–1979) through educational endeavors such as scholarships and the establishment of a museum to be located in Maury County.

In 2002 he was honored by the Liberty Bowl and Football Foundation for his contribution to amateur football.

In 2003 he received the Bobby Warton Labor of Love Award from the Highland Hundred Club.
