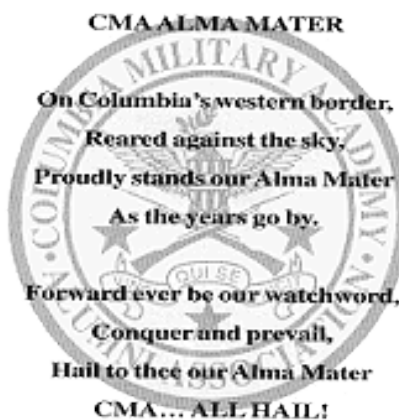
Help Keep the *Bugle* Interesting and Fresh

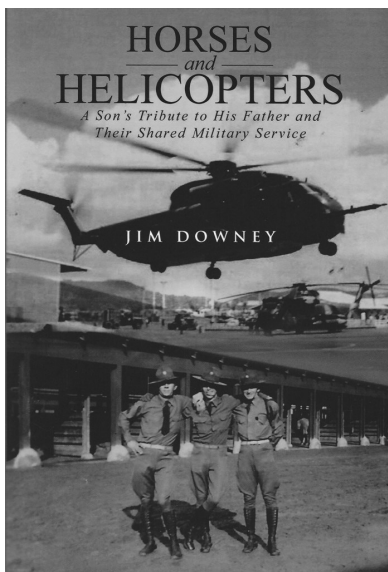

Author Profile: Jim Downey

Family history-type books can take on many forms. Most of these books, though, tend to be strictly for genealogists, but a few—just a few—can become fascinating and intriguing historical accounts that everyone can read and enjoy. Jim Downey's book, "Horses and Helicopters: A Son's Tribute to His Father and Their Shared Military Service", is an extraordinary book, telling in personal terms a son's journey through his father's military career and his own. This book is also a model for any potential author who wants to write about the heroes in their own family.



Jim Downey was born at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, the son of James Downey, a First Sergeant in an all black Artillery Battalion. James's military service would probably rival any of the many well-known heroes of World War II. James joined the military in 1927 at age 16 and was one of the very last horse soldiers. In 1932, James was stationed in China, but during World War II, James fought in the Pacific and European theatres—just about everywhere—including at the D-Day Invasion. After the war, James participated in the occupation of Germany and was later assigned to Raritan Arsenal in New Jersey. He eventually retired from service and has since passed away.

Son Jim's memory and story began in occupied Germany, where he lived from 1948 to 1951 with his parents. As a young boy, he picked up the German language quickly and actually acted as a translator for his parents. After graduating from Columbia Military Academy in Tennessee in 1958, he immediately

Enlisted in the Air Force. As physics was his best course at the academy, Jim became an aircraft hydraulics technician. In 1966, Jim made his first of three tours to Vietnam, reminiscent of his father's three tours overseas. Eventually, Jim was stationed at our former England Air Force Base in 1972. Sadly, Jim later learned that he was severely affected by the defoliant chemical Agent Orange, a herbicide used tactically during the war. He was exposed from his work on the planes used to spray it in Vietnam. When asked about his thoughts on the Vietnam War, Jim responded, "I was mad that we didn't win. We drew a line in the sand and wouldn't cross it."

Upon settling in Alexandria in the early 1970s, Jim helped bring a million dollars to our community by arranging for a national jamboree here for the citizen band radio enthusiasts, a first for our area. Jim later worked at Pinecrest and set up their safety program. In 1985, Jim became a state inspector of Medicaid facilities in our area. He said of the job, "I stirred up the nursing home industry by doing what I was supposed to do." In 1986, using the GI Bill, Jim graduated from Northwestern, later earning a Masters in Management in 1992. Later, he started "Rapides Island" water services in Western Rapides Parish. His last job was working for CASA for four years until ill health finally caught up with him.

Jim is proud of his book highlighting his father's military career and his own career, both very similar. Jim was inspired to write the book when he was sent a questionnaire to fill out by a military group that required Jim to do some research on his father. Pouring through his father's papers was like reconstructing his father's life and subsequently his own. Jim is very satisfied with the book, but more can be added to his story. "I wish more members of the military would write about their service," says Jim.

His remarkable book is available from iUniverse Publishing.

Shannon Sloan Gilchrist, 73, resident of Columbia, died July 10th, 2020 at Williamson Medical Center. Born September 2, 1946, in Maury County, she was the daughter of the late Jack Farrington Sloan and the late Virginia Bills Shannon Sloan. She was a graduate of Columbia Central High School's Class of 1964.

She went on to attend the University of Kentucky before transferring to Memphis State University, where she received her B.S. in Elementary Education. She taught at Pikes Peak Christian School in Colorado Springs, CO, was a substitute teacher and volunteer for Columbia Academy, and worked 10 years as the school director at Graymere Church of Christ Tuesday/Thursday School. Shannon was married to Mike Gilchrist, CMA Class of 1963. She was a devoted military wife and mother, supporting Mike and their older son well during their Air Force careers. After Mike's retirement, the two enjoyed traveling together. She and Mike were active in the CMA Alumni Association and Shannon devoted much time and energy to the Association, especially when Mike was serving as the CMAAA President from 2012-2016. Her dedication to the Association was evident as she was instrumental to the execution of the bi-annual CMAAA Reunions. She is survived by her husband of 52 years, Michael Lane Gilchrist Sr., whom she married June 22, 1968; sons, Michael Lane (Wendi) Gilchrist Jr. and Jack Sloan (Katie) Gilchrist; and grandchildren, Hannah Gilchrist, Sarah Gilchrist, and Andrew Gilchrist.

William Ralph Jones, Jr. died on June 4, 2020, at age 95. Mr. Jones was born in Selma, Alabama, to William Ralph Jones, Sr., and Josie Bell Wallis Jones on November 2, 1924. He attended Humboldt, Tennessee City Schools through the 11th grade and then attended CMA for one year, graduating with the Class of 1942. He enlisted in the U.S. Army in December 1942. WWII he served in the 3rd Army, 94th Infantry Division, 376th Infantry Regiment, in the European Thea-

tre. While in service to his country, he earned the Combat Infantry Badge, Bronze Star, Purple Heart, European Theatre Ribbon with 4 Battle Stars, and the Presidential Unit Citation. His unit experienced 236 consecutive days of continuous engagement with the enemy before and during the Battle of the Bulge as well as the days in the breakout afterwards. In November of 1945 he was Honorably Discharged from the U.S. Army and returned to Humboldt. Beginning in 1946 he enrolled in the Textile Engineering program at North Carolina State University and obtained his engineering degree in 1949. After graduation he entered the family business of Jones Manufacturing Company becoming the 3rd generation of his family in textiles. He retired after over 50 years of service and while having had served as President, CEO, and Chairman of the company. In 1947 he married the love of his life, Bettie Jean "BJ" Graves from Humboldt. She preceded him in death in 2016 after 69 years of marriage.

Alfred Popkess "Al" White, 92, passed away on July 20, 2020, at his home in Hot Springs, Arkansas. Al was born on February 12, 1928 in Little Rock, Arkansas to the late Alfred Popkess White, Sr. and Mary Nell White. He spent his early years in Russellville and Pine Bluff, Arkansas and graduated from CMA in the Class of 1946. He then attended the University of Arkansas and received a BBA in 1951. While serving in the United States Army, Al attained the rank of 1st Lieutenant acting as a cryptographic officer in Washington D.C. during the Korean War. In 1954, he returned to Pine Bluff and began his over 50-year career in the cotton buying business alongside his father. Al's lifelong passion was classic Jazz music. He traveled the world listening to and promoting Jazz, including an annual trip to Odessa, Texas to attend the West Texas Jazz Party for over 50 years. In 2000, Al published his book, *Jazz Party*, a tribute to all the men and women who brought him endless joy through music. He was later inducted into the Arkansas Jazz Hall of Fame in 2002 for his dedication and efforts in promoting Jazz music. Al was highly active in his

Church and community, serving twice as Senior Warden at Trinity Episcopal Church, President of the Pine Bluff Rotary Club and a Paul Harris Fellow. He also served as President of the Arkansas-Missouri Cotton Trade Association and as a board member of the American Cotton Shippers Association. In 1966 he was appointed a United States Commissioner prosecuting federal crimes. Years later, he served as a Shelby County Juvenile Court Judge focused on helping troubled youth. 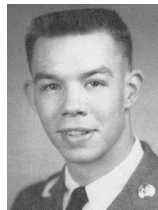

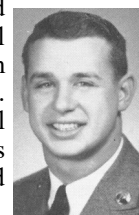

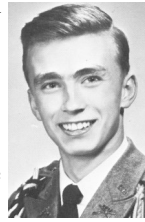
