Support Your Association





Come Make Some This Year

Editor's Note: The following two writeups are what make having the Bugle so important to the CMA Alumni Association. Not because of the subject of the articles (though it is great), but because it shows that we all have the opportunity to recall some great memories by reading the Bugle. These two write-ups by Len Taliaferro and Joe Sullivan (thanks for the pictures) were in response to the article by Russell Thompson in the Winter Edition of the Bugle. It is great to see that alumni are enjoying the Bugle and using it to revive, and share, old memories. Thanks Russell, Len and Joe for sharing with the rest of us.

Regarding Russell Thompson's article in the Winter edition of the Bugle about the country and western band that Vic Burnham et al put together. I did some digging starting with my sophomore year which is covered in the 1954 Recall. I thought I remembered some annual pictures of that band but the only thing I could find was one photo in the 1954 annual of Jimmy Baker and Eddie Harrison plinking on guitars with the cutline saying "Ramblers." I don't know if Russell is thinking of someone else when he mentioned the name of Eddie Johnson or if he mixed up the name of Eddie Harrison. I definitely remember that Eddie Harrison, Jimmy Baker and Danny Pugh were part of the group. Pugh was an incredible saxophone player from Memphis, but he got into strings for the group. I think they



may have been called the CMA Ramblers. According to my annuals and my recollection, Russell Thompson was in the Class of '55 and his late brother Grant was my classmate in the Class of '56...dubbed by Vic Burnham as "the Class the Stars Fell On"...due in part to the musical talents of this group. I'm pretty sure the group did not get going until at least the fall of 1953 or maybe even as late as the spring of 1954. I think Grant and Russell roomed together for maybe a couple of years before Russell moved out. Don't recall if he left North Johnson but Grant stayed in the northeast upstairs corner until we graduated...I think. I somehow seem to recall that Grant and Marvin Vernon roomed together in that room then Marvin moved on to room with my brother but I don't remember where in North Johnson they wound up. I was in the northwest downstairs corner room all four years at CMA.

Len Taliaferro, '56

They called themselves the "CMA Ramblers", and their photo is in the inside front and back cover of the 1954 RECALL (on the CMAAA website if you don't have your copy). I remember them well. They used to give shows in the Main auditorium. Dick Logan was a PG with my class of 1955. Very talented guitar and fiddle player. I remember seeing Dick Logan at one of our reunions years ago at the Saturn Union Hall. Way back in the 60's, I recall seeing Vic Burnham on national TV one night playing with a folk group on the show called "HOOTENANNY." Always wondered if he continued life as a professional musician.

The D.R. (Delinquency Report)

I attended CMA from 1950-52. I lived in North Black, first floor. We were a close bunch, mostly seniors. We had a lot of "bull sessions" and most were held in the room of McCarthy & Wilkins, Room 10 which faced the front walk near Captain Prickett's quarters. However, it was a large drop off at this point. One day during a bull session, I was sitting on the windowsill with the large drop-off underneath. I was safe as I was aware of the precarious position and took precautions. All of a sudden, Tom McCarthy pushed me as if to cause me to fall. I did not fall. But I cursed. Unfortunately, Coach Prickett was just passing by and he heard me. Demerits were in order and spring break was a week away. Coach Pricket. being a nice guy, recommended leniency. So, I received 20 demerits instead of the normal 50. Now how am I going to work these demerits of prior to Spring break? This is a special Spring break, as I am going to Mississippi (assuming I work my demerits off). Well, obviously the faculty did not want to be at the school during break so they did everything possible so I could work off my demerits. I recall picking up paper and rubbish from the campus. I marched several hours and my cadet company commander, Johnny Chenault, was the Officer of the Day and directed the marching of we delinquents. He decided some training was in order. So he gave us all of our marching commands on the wrong foot, and told us just to take another step and execute the order. We practiced that for a couple of hours and that training later came in handy for me.

At any rate, I did work off all the 20 demerits (there may have been some cheating by the Commandant's Office) and I was on the bus to Mississippi.! I should note that I had had no demerits during either of my years at CMA except for this event. For some reason, I was lauded at graduation for completing the year with no demerits (although I had received 20)!

Then and Now

Gene Van Meter, Class of '59

Gene's older brother, Jim Van Meter, started at CMA in 1955. He attended 4 years and graduated Class of '59 with honors as a platoon commander in band company. Gene started as a fresh-

man in the fall of 1959 as a very young 13 year-old. The friends Jim had made, who were now seniors, took Gene under their wing, especially Roger Adams, and kept him from getting too many demerits (he got



enough on his own). He spent four years at South Black with a different roommate every year, one even left at Christmas break. After taking a retest in trig on graduation weekend he graduated the class of '63 with as а First Sargent. Having enough of formal education and with the draft looming he joined the Navy in the fall of 63. After four years at CMA he breezed through boot camp and "A" school. He was assigned to the USS Princeton, a WW2 aircraft carrier with a wooden flight deck that had been converted to carry 24 helicopters and a battalion of Marines. The Princeton earned 5 battle stars during the Vietnam war and Gene was on board for the first two of those. Discharged the day he turned 21 he got a job with the phone company as a lineman, but he always wanted to fly airplanes so he went to work at Bowman field in Louisville as a line boy servicing airplanes and taking flight lessons when he could afford them. It took almost two years, but he got his private license and at that point he could apply to the G.I. bill and it would pay for 90% of the rest of his flight training. So off he went to Ft Worth to complete his training once again servicing airplanes to pay for room and board. After about a year he had all the basic ratings, commercial, instrument and flight instructor. His first flying job was in Henderson, Ky where he flew charter, did flight instruction, swept floors, pumped gas and met his future wife, Becky. In 1971 he moved back to Bowman Field and got married. In July of 73 he was hired to be the co-pilot on a new Beechcraft King Air, owned by a company called Extendicare. They were getting out of the nursing home business and into owning hospitals. They soon changed their name to Humana and he would stay with them for the next 40 years. In

1978 he got the highest rating available, Airline Transport Pilot and his first jet type rating. In the 1980's Humana was big into heart transplants. The call would come in, usually late at night after a car wreck, the aircraft would be loaded up with the transplant team plus an igloo cooler for the heart and off they would go. These were time critical flights, usually about two hours maximum, so priority was given to the plane over all air traffic. Then back to Louisville and the doctors would go to work. By 1990 Humana had sold all the hospitals and had gone strictly to health insurance. In 1990 they entered in a partnership with Baylor University to provide medical supplies, along with doctors and nurses to the people of Romania after the fall of Ceausescu. In the ten years the program went on, he got to visit every airport in Romania a lot of times as the first U.S. registered aircraft to ever land there. In 2013 the company decided to enact an age 65 retirement policy for the pilots and CEO. Gene was 67 at the time, so this provided a grace-

ful way to exit from a job that was hard to walk away from. He had amassed over 18,000 flight hours, had flown the Berlin corridor, two ex-presidents, Regan and Carter, two former first ladies, Barbara Bush



and Rosalyn Carter and the former leader of the Soviet Union, Mikhail Gorbachev. He has thoroughly enjoyed his retirement. Next year he and Becky will celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary. Their son, two grandchildren, and two great grandchildren all live close by, and grandson Matt now flies for Humana. It does not take much imagination to see how Gene would have ended up without the education he received in the classrooms, barracks and bullring of CMA and for that he will always be eternally grateful.

Becky Moon, Class of '75

Becky was 11 years old in the spring of 1969. Her parents informed her that Columbia Military Academy was going to enroll girls in the fall semester and they thought it was a "good" opportunity for her. Even at 11 years old she didn't remember her life without CMA. Stories about the school and visits from former cadets were common. Her grandfather, Aubrey Wright, had been an instructor at CMA for 22 years (1918 -40); her uncle, William Wright was a 1938 graduate; and her father, Major Reuben Algood, was the Professor of Military Science and

Military Science and Tactics (PMST) from 1952-54. The fact that Major Algood was posted to CMA is the "reason" Becky's <u>here</u> ... he met her mom, Alice Wright, while living in Columbia.



Becky knew attending school there was going to be different than going to the Sunday afternoon parade or seeing the cadets march into town or hearing "Bell Hop" yelled across the theater. But she didn't know that her most treasured and lifelong friends and relationships would have their genesis on that campus. Girls were day students and their experiences unique in the military prep school environment. She graduated in the spring of 1975 well prepared for college and life's challenges. Her parents had a wicked or ironic sense of humor because for 6 years they sent her to a basically all male institution and then proceeded to enroll her in an all-female college - Mississippi University for Women. It was not an easy transition for Becky but with the help of her best friend from CMA, Cathy Cooper (CMA '75) and the CMA graduates that were close by at Mississippi State, she survived. After graduating MUW with a political science and economics degree she moved to Washington DC and worked on Capital Hill. She kept her roots close to home and worked for US Senator John Stennis of Mississippi and a couple of US House members from Mississippi and Tennessee. She met some remarkable people ... from US Presidents to obscure foreign country representatives. Several times she was a guest of CMA graduates that had settled in and around the DC area. Her most memorable CMA friend from DC was William R. Anderson, Class of

1938. "Bill" was a US Naval Academy graduate, Commander of the USS Nautilus and former TN Congressman. Becky's grandfather had been one of his instructors at CMA and for both of them that



was enough of a connection. After living in DC for 5 years Becky was ready

to return south and raise her family. She took a decade or so "off" to be a classroom mom, boy scout and girl scout mom, and a most enthusiastic She returned to the soccer mom. "outside of the home" workforce in 1994 and is currently working for her 6th different member of congress. She serves as Field Director for Tennessee's Fourth District Congressman. While she understands there are those that do not have fond memoires of CMA for valid reasons of their own but as she said earlier there has never been a time when she did not have CMA in her life. She drives by the campus most every day and has a flash of memory. She says that sometimes it is a sadness for those we've lost but the memory is always with a gratefulness and a respect that she had the opportunity and privilege to be a part of the Corps of Cadets and the Long Gray Line.

CMA Memories September 1954—May 1959

Do some of you old boys remember the Cuban Cadets returning from vacation with Cuban cigarettes? They were much too strong for American taste. The Cuban slang term for them was "Little Deaths". We referred to them as "Coffin Nails".

Ma Cannon's Pies...The Best!

Blocker's barber shop, housed in the basement under the Office. A warm place and a warm welcome from Mr. Blocker the Barber.

The Library was a good place to spend cold Saturday mornings between Barracks Inspection and 2nd Mess. A warm and comfortable place to read.

It was difficult to be a chronic bully as a boarding Cadet. There were too many opportunities for a victim to retaliate with shaving cream in the bully's shoes or a spoonful of sugar in the bully's bunk bed. They usually left after a semester or two.

One night during study break as we walked up the concrete steps to the Peep Inn door, a Cadet called "Speedy" Gonzales a "sp..". That was about the worst name you could call a South American Cadet. I heard a sound behind me, and as I turned around I saw the unfortunate bully wanna be flat on his back on those steps. Speedy was standing over him and said "If you call me that again I will hurt you." Speedy was a weight lifter and wrestler with the build of a concrete block. I hope he made it through the Cuban Revolution and is living somewhere in Florida. He was a good boy.

Winter afternoons were a good opportunity to visit the cooks' break room off the kitchen and try to beat Popeye or Old Buck at checkers. Occasionally I would even win a game. Those guys were good.

Cadets going to town for afternoon leave would usually visit the Polk Theater for a movie. It was just over a mile from the front gate to the box office and could be walked in about 15 minutes. If it was raining or you were running late and had the extra money, there was always a Linnville Taxi parked at the front gate. They would transport us to town for 25 cents per Cadet when the cab was full. By "full" I mean 7 or 8 boys. The price was right, but the trip would result in scuffed shoes and a wrinkled uniform.

The three or four formal dances a year were great. Held in the gym, it was an opportunity to meet and dance with pretty girls whether or not you had a date yourself.

Weekly grades posted outside the Mess Hall.

Delinquency notices posted nightly outside the Commandant's Office.

I never understood why the official term for Bullring was "Penalty Tours". We didn't tour anything unless you mean marching around the Quadrangle for an hour.

Mess Hall tables seated a Faculty Officer at one end and two Cadet Officers or Non-Coms at the other. Between them were five Cadets on each side. The food was good. We had fried chicken for lunch every Sunday. My first two years I was seated right in the middle and by the time the platter got to me the only chicken left was a wing. I ate them and now they are my favorite piece.

My mind is failing and my memory is slipping away, but I still remember clearly all the Spanish cuss words we learned from the South American Cadets those many years ago.

So many memories. What fine boys and faculty. What a wonderful school!
