CMA Alumnus Receives Silver Star for War Heroism

Phillip Fikes of Huntsville, Alabama stood a reluctant center of attention on Friday, October 17th 2014, a decorated Vietnam War hero who appeared to be fighting tears instead of the Viet Cong.

Even war heroes, it was plain to see, have feelings too.

His wife, Frances, stood beside him as a standing ovation filled with appreciation and admiration from an overflow crowd showered down upon him during a ceremony where Fikes was awarded the Silver Star Medal at Redstone Arsenal's Sparkman Center.

"I was very excited, ecstatic, that I did something right," Fikes said before the ceremony, dismissing the role he played in rescuing wounded soldiers on May 23, 1969.

According to his Silver Star citation, this is what Fikes did "right" while on a reconnaissance in force mission in the Kien Hoa Province:

"Immediately after being inserted, the company began receiving heavy automatic weapons fire from three sides. Ignoring the danger of the situation, Lieutenant Fikes immediately moved forward to help those who had been wounded in the initial burst of fire. He crossed the 100 meters of fire-swept terrain between himself and the casualties and began helping them to an evacuation site. In the middle of his efforts with the wounded, he halted long enough to lead an assault on the enemy positions, destroying several and lessen-

ing the volume of fire to the extent that he could finish evacuating the wounded."

Three days later, Fikes encountered a booby trap that took part of his thumb, injured his left knee and caused permanent partial paralysis. Yet he still eventually learned to walk again.



During his five months in Vietnam, Fikes twice received the Bronze Star as well as the Purple Heart, among other awards.

It wasn't until last year, though, that Fikes realized he had been awarded the Silver Star—the third highest military decoration for valor that can be awarded.

He was inducted last year into the Madison County Hall of Heroes and, in the process of that induction, Fikes requested his personnel file from the Army. The file did not arrive until after the Hall of Heroes ceremony.

"Upon opening the package, one of the things in the package was the Silver Star. That's when I found out about it", Fikes said. He then jokingly added, "That's where I messed up. I should have kept my mouth shut."

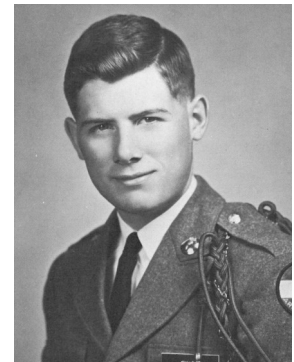
It led Fikes to being surrounded by a bevy of friends and family at the ceremony. He received the Silver Star from General Dennis Via, Commander of the U.S. Army Materiel Command at Redstone Arsenal.

"I'm tremendously honored, on behalf of the United States Army, to participate in LT Fikes' Silver Star ceremony today", Via said before the ceremony. "It's a fitting reminder and a

visual tribute to his service and sacrifice to our nation, his gallantry in combat, his actions, and representative of his tremendous service to our nation. It's also a visual reminder of the unselfish service and sacrifice of our men and women in uniform who defend our nation's freedoms and also of the sacrifice of their families. It's a great day for the Army, it's a great day for the Fikes family and it's a great day for the Vietnam veterans, who have not always received the recognition and honor that they deserve for their selfless service to our nation."

Fikes spoke for less than two minutes during the ceremony.

"While the Silver Star was presented to me", he said in closing, "I can only accept it on behalf of the soldiers who I had the honor and privilege of serving with in Vietnam. So for them and for me, I say thank you and God bless America."

CMA Memories

This year, earlier in the spring, I was honored by a visit here in Ocean Springs, Mississippi, by Benny Ferdon, CMA Class of 1955, former roommate, then a resident of Narco, Louisiana, now a physician and long time resident of Raleigh, North Carolina. It was a reunion of sorts since both our wives got to visit as well, and we enjoyed re-living some of the old times. Benny and I and another friend from Jackson, Mississippi, made a road trip together in the summer of 1954 (prior to our senior year at CMA) to go down the west side of Florida (well before Disney was anything except the comics) to Key West and back up the east side to see Marine Land and on to New Orleans for Benny's home on the return. We had a wonderful trip over about two weeks on the road, and even went to Cuba by air from Key West and enjoyed the best of Havana for two days. We followed that with Miami. At the start of the trip we each had about \$200 for our expenses and a Texaco credit card with a 1949 Ford loaned by my father. Credit cards back then only were good for gas. The idea was that we could always get back home on it. And by the time we passed Jacksonville on the way north and west, we had just enough cash left for lunch at a country road side restaurant somewhere before Tallahassee. That was a memorable trip for three 17 year olds. Times were a little different back then. The good years. Benny has done well since his graduation from Tulane Medical School. CMA can be proud of him.

I have now served four years as a lay Pastor of a small Presbyterian Church, located in Lucedale, Mississippi, an old community north of the Mississippi Gulf Coast, a well established farming area. It has been a great privilege to serve the Lord and the people in this manner. I am given more of a chance to reflect on meaningful things in weekly sermon preparation from the Bible, but life, including Christian life, is what is reflected from it for our illustration of our contemporary functions as a church and community. Thinking back to CMA helps me come to deeper understanding of what I am doing. It helped me back in 1968 when I was stationed at Bien Hoa Air Base in Viet Nam as a Judge Advocate. CMA

discipline traits have been the secular strength of my life. I feel sure that many others of the CMA community of graduates have experienced some of these same feelings. They coexist with our religious life as well.

An event I remember from my time at CMA is the apparent one time event of a Cadet dying in an automobile accident on campus. Courtney Wilhoite and I were in the 7th Grade at the time and we both remember things about the incident. The cadet involved in the accident was Robert Frank (Flea Bite) Jernigan, Jr. and the accident occurred on Saturday, February 1, 1947.

I recall the event occurring on a night of a dance on campus. I heard about the accident at the dance but did not go to the scene. The location of the accident was on the west side of the road between Moore Hall and the baseball field. There was an old log cabin on the baseball field side of the road, the closest side probably 20 feet from the road. There was a rather steep downward slope in the terrain from the road to the cabin.

I remember the Cadet Corps attending the funeral but do not recall if we marched there in formation or did the usual Sunday Morning stroll along the sidewalk. Formation without band seems more likely.

While we had numerous cadets pass away while attending CMA, I believe this is the only incident in which a cadet died as the result of a car accident on the campus.

James Dickinson ('55) and his Wife Barbara fly Space-A to Hawaii and Back

(Note—Space Available, or Space-A, travel is a program whereby military members, active and retired, can travel on military aircraft to certain destinations when there is space available on the aircraft)

Although we visited Hawaii on four previous occasions over the years using commercial travel, my wife and I decided to tackle the challenge and adventure that a Space-A trip would provide. We didn't have to wait long. Our plan was to travel to Dover AFB, Delaware, spend the night at base lodging, and travel across the street to the passenger terminal the next morning. We learned of a 24 hour delay so we decided to travel 45 miles back home and try again for departure the next morning. This time it worked!

Departing Dover on 7 September on a C-17 with only five Space-A passengers (four adults plus a one year old infant) in the empty cargo bay, the flight arrived at Travis AFB, California in five hours. Since on-base lodging was already booked, we were able to spend the night at a Marriot Courtyard at military rates. We were in luck again the next morning as passenger terminal personnel confirmed that a C-5 to Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, Hawaii, would indeed make a Sunday morning departure. This final leg of the trip took another five hours with 18 Space-A passengers aboard who all enjoyed commercial-type seating the C-5 provides.

Without knowing our likely arrival day in Honolulu, we didn't make advanced arrangements for lodging, but decided to take "pot luck" and try to get in the Hale Koa (military hotel on Waikiki Beach) for a few days. To our surprise, the effort was successful, and we spent the next four days there. From a free publication, "Hawaii Military Guide", at the hotel we learned of beach

cottage rentals at the Navy's missile tracking site (Pacific Missile Range Facility Barking Sands) on the adjacent island of Kauai. A phone call to the recreational facility there got us four more nights of military lodging. If one is looking for serenity, this is the place to go! It does have a Shoppette, gym, swimming pool and meals available at the All-Hands Club.

Our return trip from Hawaii was luckily the reverse route of coming to the islands and also aboard C-17s. Since Pearl Harbor-Hickman is actively



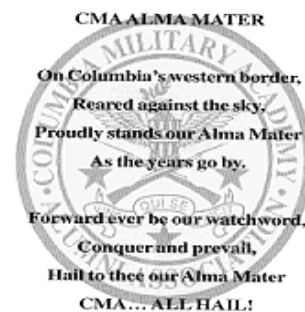

a passenger hub for the Pacific Theater, many folks and planes are continuously in and out of this terminal. Our outbound Space-A count rose to 29 people going to Travis, then down to 15 going back to Dover the following day; again, with an overnight stay in base lodging.

Like most Space-A travel, change is a consideration one must always take into account. Travel tools you find most useful are Facebook access for the live

Space-A schedules and a cell phone to continually communicate with the respective passenger desk personnel at AMC terminals you expect to depart from. In our case, we experienced a one day delay in flight departures in both directions, so staying up-to-date was meaningful in our decision making.

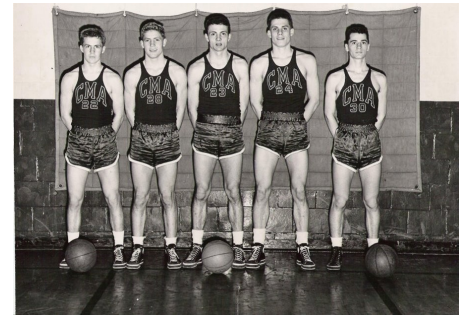

CMA Endowment Update



Help Preserve CMA's Legacy

The CMA Endowment, established under Columbia Academy's endowment program, is a vehicle for preserving CMA's legacy. This endowment will be used exclusively to provide funds to preserve and protect the legacy of Columbia Military Academy. The goal is to (1) ensure the maintenance and upkeep of the CMA Museum for perpetuity, (2) preserve and protect the original buildings of the Columbia Arsenal and other buildings that were part of Columbia Military Academy, and (3) maintain the memorials and markers across campus that are dedicated to CMA and its alumni. This endowment will be accounted for separately from the other endowments at Columbia Academy and the CMA Alumni Association, or its designee, will receive an accounting of the funds each year. This endowment was established with an initial investment of \$10,000 that was provided by an anonymous Columbia Academy alumnus. That initial gift was made in honor of all CMA alumni, faculty and staff, especially those who served our country in the military, and most especially, those who gave their lives for our country. In addition to that donation, four additional donations were made in 2014. CMA Alumni and Friends are encouraged to make donations to the endowment and to consider including the endowment in their estate planning. To make a donation to the endowment, please send a check made out to Columbia Academy and annotated as a donation for the CMA Endowment to Columbia Academy, 1101 West Seventh Street, Columbia, Tennessee 38401. All donations are tax deductible and will result in the donor receiving a receipt from Columbia Academy that can be used when filing tax returns.

John Lynch, Class of '46

Dr. John "J.B." Lynch, age 85 of Nashville, passed away at his home on October 20, 2014. Dr. Lynch was born on February 5, 1929 to the late John A. and Eloise Brown Lynch. He grew up in Mt. Pleasant, Tennessee and attended CMA for 2 years, graduating with the Class of 1946. He continued his education at

Vanderbilt University where he earned his undergraduate degree and then attended the University of Tennessee at Memphis Medical School where he obtained his medical degree. After completing his education, he served his country in the Air Force during the Korean War. He then moved to Galveston, Texas to complete his residency at the University of Texas Medical Branch. He became a pioneer in the medical specialty of plastic surgery during his years at UTMB. He developed a specialty in burn treatment and was instrumental in the establishment of the Shriners Burn Hospitals. He became Chairman of Plastic surgery at Vanderbilt University Medical Center and served as Chief of the Head and Neck Services in the Vanderbilt University Affiliated Hospitals. He was dedicated to advancing the medical field and developed an excellent teaching program in addition to a residency. He was a leader in many professional organizations dedicated to the advancement of medicine and plastic surgery. He served as President of Singleton Surgical Society, President of the American Society of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeons, President of the Southern Medical Association, President of American Association of Plastic Surgery, and Director of the American Board of Plastic Surgery. He received numerous awards throughout his career including the 1987 Outstanding Alumnus at the University of Tennessee Medical School and was awarded an Honorary Citation of the American Society of Plastic Surgery. He loved spending time with his children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren. He cherished his family and enjoyed the outdoors. His great joys of life were his family, church, career, hunting, fishing and golfing. He is survived by his loving wife, Mary Joyce Lynch; his children, John B. Lynch, Jr. (Missy) and Mary Callihan (Matt), step-daughter, Jennye

Greene and numerous grandchildren, great grandchildren, nieces and nephews.

Billy K. Walker, Class of '49

Dr. Billy K. Walker (Doc), 83, passed away on October 21, 2014 after an extended illness. He was born on May 20, 1931 in Beech Grove, Tennessee. He was preceded in death by his parents, Joseph Rayburn "Bill" Walker and Jamie (Covington) Walker Jarman.



He is survived by his daughter and son-in-law, Billy Walker Jamie and Dan Helton; son and daughter-in-law, Ken and Ingrid Walker; brother, Joe Tom Walker; grandchildren, Evan Gilman and Carley Gilman and step-grandson, Jim Grizzle. Doc grew up on the family farm. He learned to work hard in their dairy and to love animals. He attended Manchester Central High School for two years and earned a scholarship to play football at Columbia Military Academy for his last two years of high school, graduating from CMA as part of the Class of 1949. Vanderbilt University awarded him a football scholarship and he later transferred to Tennessee Wesleyan College. Doc served in the U. S. Army during the Korean War where he was trained in teletypewriter equipment and maintenance and went on to be an instructor in the military. Following his service in the Army he was awarded a football scholarship to attend Kansas State University's Veterinary School and he graduated with his Doctorate in Veterinary Medicine. After graduation he moved to Woodbury with his family and began his veterinary practice. Doc served as the only veterinarian in both Cannon and Dekalb Counties for about twenty years. Doc had a love for and interest in Cannon County. It led him to be involved in many different ventures. He was one of the founding owners of the Woodbury Nursing Home in the 1970's. Dr. Walker was active in church and was a member of the Grace Assembly of God. He spent many hours working on the food drives through the church. His love for animals and people gave him the opportunity to come into contact with many people. Doc was well known for taking in stray dogs, horses, birds or any other animal that needed care. He also raised coon hounds and enjoyed coon hunting in his limited leisure time. Doc's busy work schedule

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didn't bother him at all since his work was his joy. He wanted to share his love of animals with his children and grandchildren. During the summer he loved to have his grandchildren come stay with him on the farm. He introduced them to farming and the vet business. His daughter and granddaughter were both active with show and competition horses. He loved to watch them show whenever he could.

Lt. Col. (Ret) James C. Watley Jr., 81, of Shalimar, Florida, passed away peacefully on November 23, 2014. He was born in Tuscaloosa, Alabama on March 31, 1933. He attended CMA for 3 years, graduating with the Class of 1950 and then attended the U.S. Naval Academy, graduating in 1954.
