THE BAND

Furnishing the music for the colorful batallion parades and other similar functions was the Columbia Military Academy band of 1953-54.

Directing the band was Major L. E. Dillon, and leading the marching band was Cadet W. R. Thompson, Jr., Drum Major, of Galveston, Texas. The staff of cadet officers consisted of Captain Harbison, Hamburg, Arkansas; First Lieutenant Schultz, Lambert, Mississippi; Second Lieutenant Barkalow, Centerville, Alabama; and Second Lieutenant Haston, McMinnville, Tennessee.

Preparation for the school term of 1953-54 began two weeks before school opened with the annual band camp in the beautiful Roosevelt State Park near Morton, Mississippi. Seventeen members attended the camp. In addition to several rehearsals a day, the group enjoyed boating, swimming, and fishing. This six-day camp provided Major Dillon a group of experienced band members around whom he developed the unit when school opened.

The band was made up of ten well balanced instrument sections excelling in both marshal and concert music from the well stocked band library.

A sharp appearance was presented by the band everywhere they performed by their special uniforms consisting of red helmets, red silk scarves, red and blue citation cords, white pistol belts, and white leggings. These colorful uniforms showed the public that this was not just another hight school band, but the Military Band of the South, as the unit was appropriately named at Blytheville, Arkansas.

The name of Columbia Military Academy was spread throughout many sections of the South as its band performed in distant and nearby cities. The National Cottonpicking Contest, only two weeks after school opened, was the band's first trip and called for a large amount of practice before the event. The fourteen days were well spent in preparation for this trip, and the people attending the Cottonpicking Contest saw a top-notch band from C.M.A. that participated in two parades and furnished the music during the judging of the cotton picked by the contestants.

In February the band traveled to historic New Orleans for the renowned Mardi Gras Celebration and marched in three parades through the city. Other band trips included the Christmas parades in Florence, Alabama; Mt. Pleasant, Tennessee; and Hohenwald, Tennessee; and the Annual Strawberry Festival at Humboldt, Tennessee.

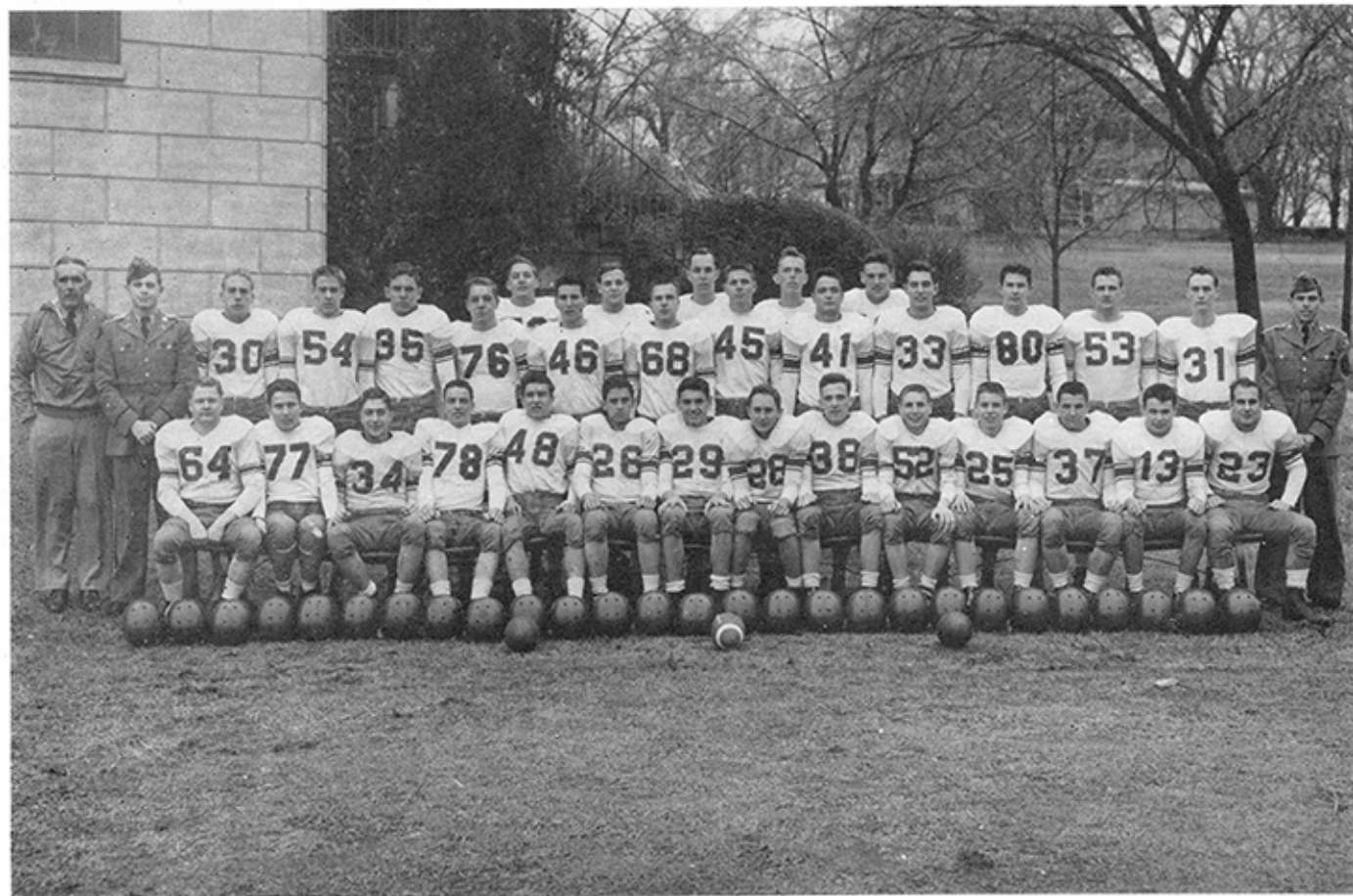
The varsity football team led by Captains Monroe Pointer and Gerald Morgan completed the 1953 season with a record of five wins and four losses.

C.M.A. . . 33; T.M.I. 20

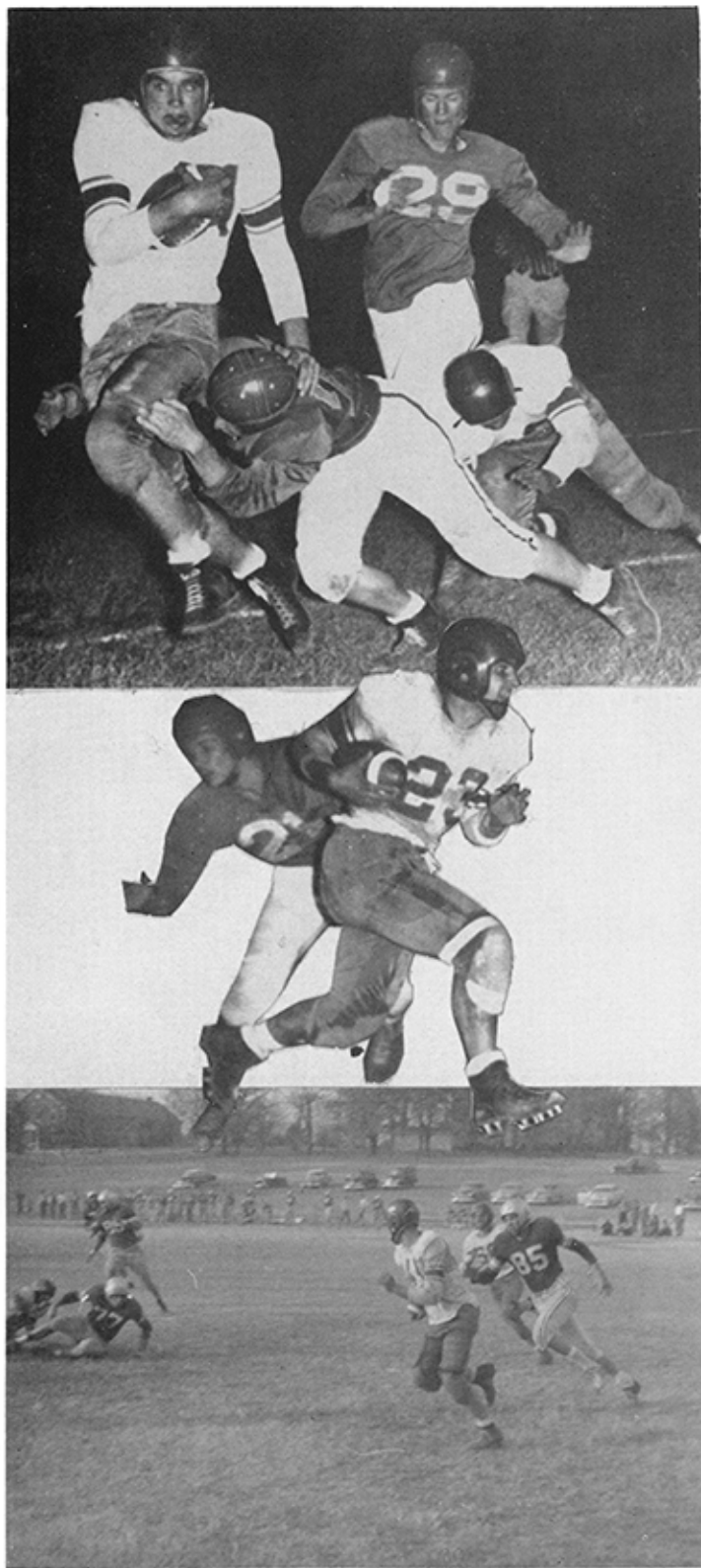

A fake placement attempt and a Morgan-Ray aerial netted the extra point. Reynolds picked up a Riverside fumble in the second quarter and carried it to the sixteen; gains by Morgan and Pointer enabled Citrano to score, 13-0 C.M.A. The opening of the second half saw Mabry recover a fumble, Pointer sprint thirty-seven yards and Morgan score from the two. McCloy's catch was good for the extra point. The last touchdown came when Reynolds recovered another fumble and Pointer went around the right side for the score. Citrano booted the extra point. Outstanding on defense were guards Jim Poe and Marshall Cranford, tackle Sam Reynolds, and halfback Jimmy Cook.

Sewanee took the kickoff and drove to the nineteen, where their field goal attempt was good for three points. The ball changed sides twice, then C.M.A. drove to pay dirt due to the running of Halliburton, Morgan, and Cook—the score being a pass from Morgan to McCloy. Ray's catch made it 7-3 C.M.A. A Sewanee fumble, two long gains, a pass to Ray in the end zone and one to McCloy for an extra tally made the score 12-9, Sewanee scoring two seconds before the half. Sewanee was held to a standstill and the Bulldogs scored again on a pass to Ray—Cook made the extra point. The game ended with excellent defensive play on both sides.

The powerful Darlington eleven received the first break of the game and took advantage of it by scoring the game's first touchdown. C.M.A.'s only tally was the result of a long downfield drive and a twelve-yard scoring pass from quarterback Gerald Morgan to end Randy McCloy.

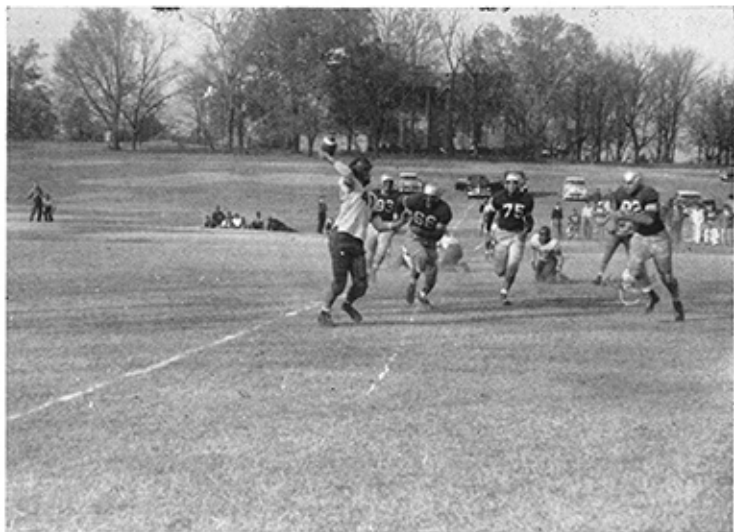
Our offensive was unable to gain on the ground or in the air against the Georgia team, but the Bulldogs fought all the way to the final whistle.

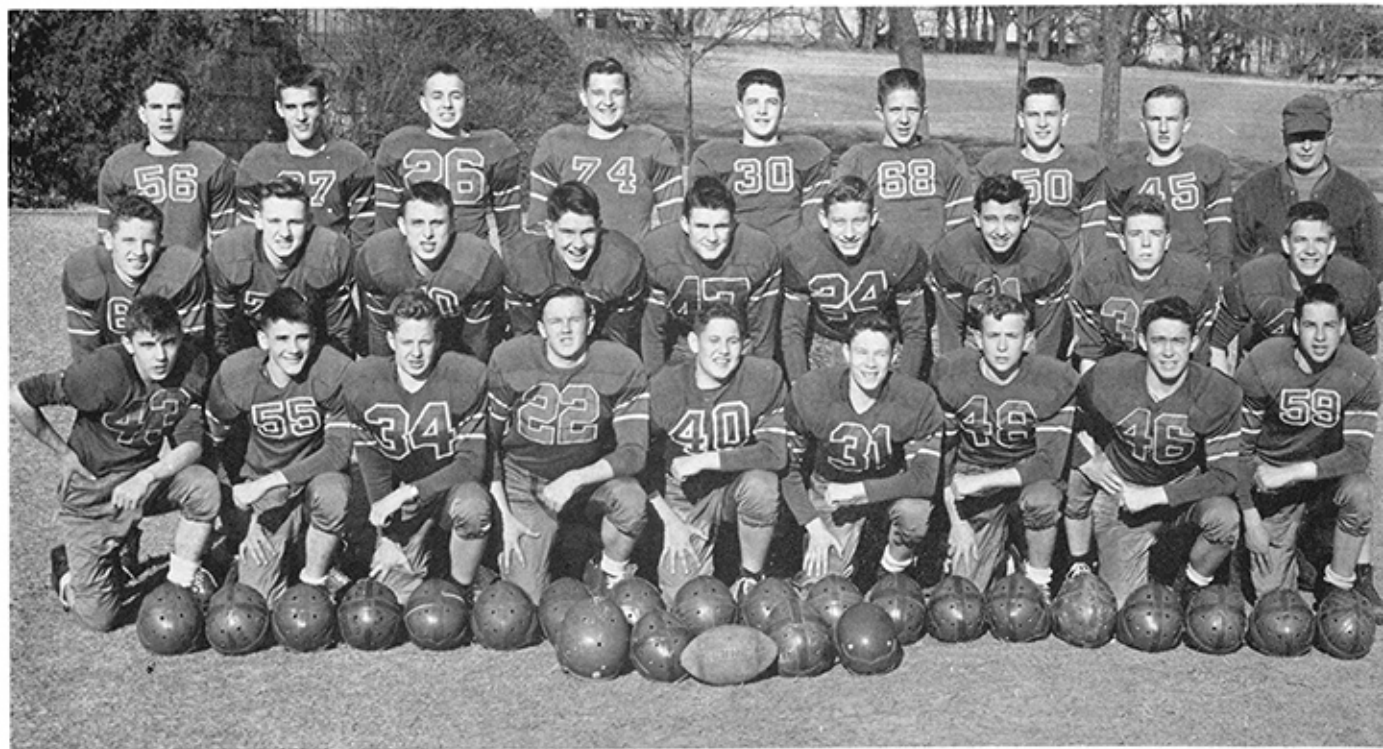
C.M.A. . . 0; G.M.A. . . . 19

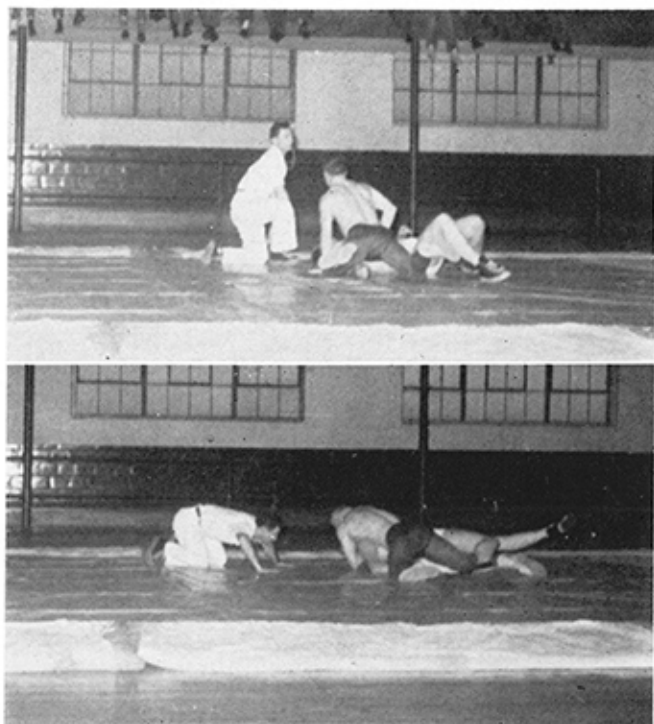

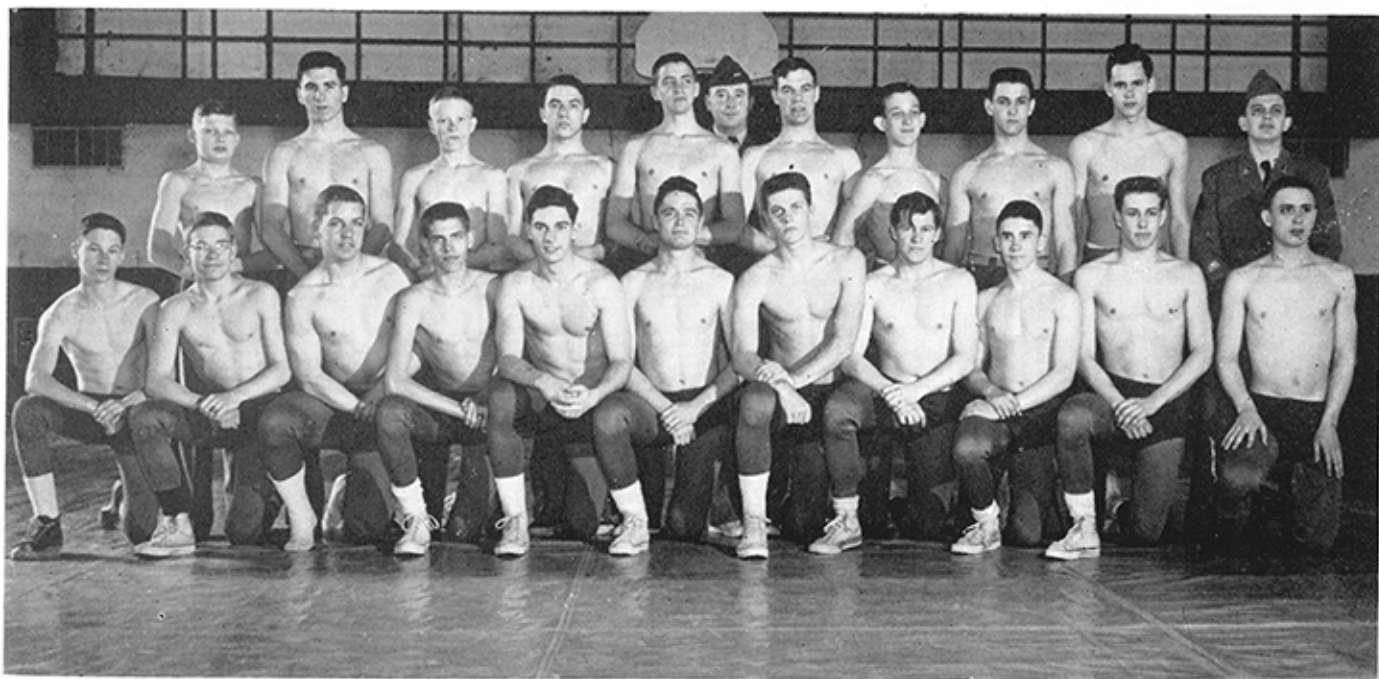

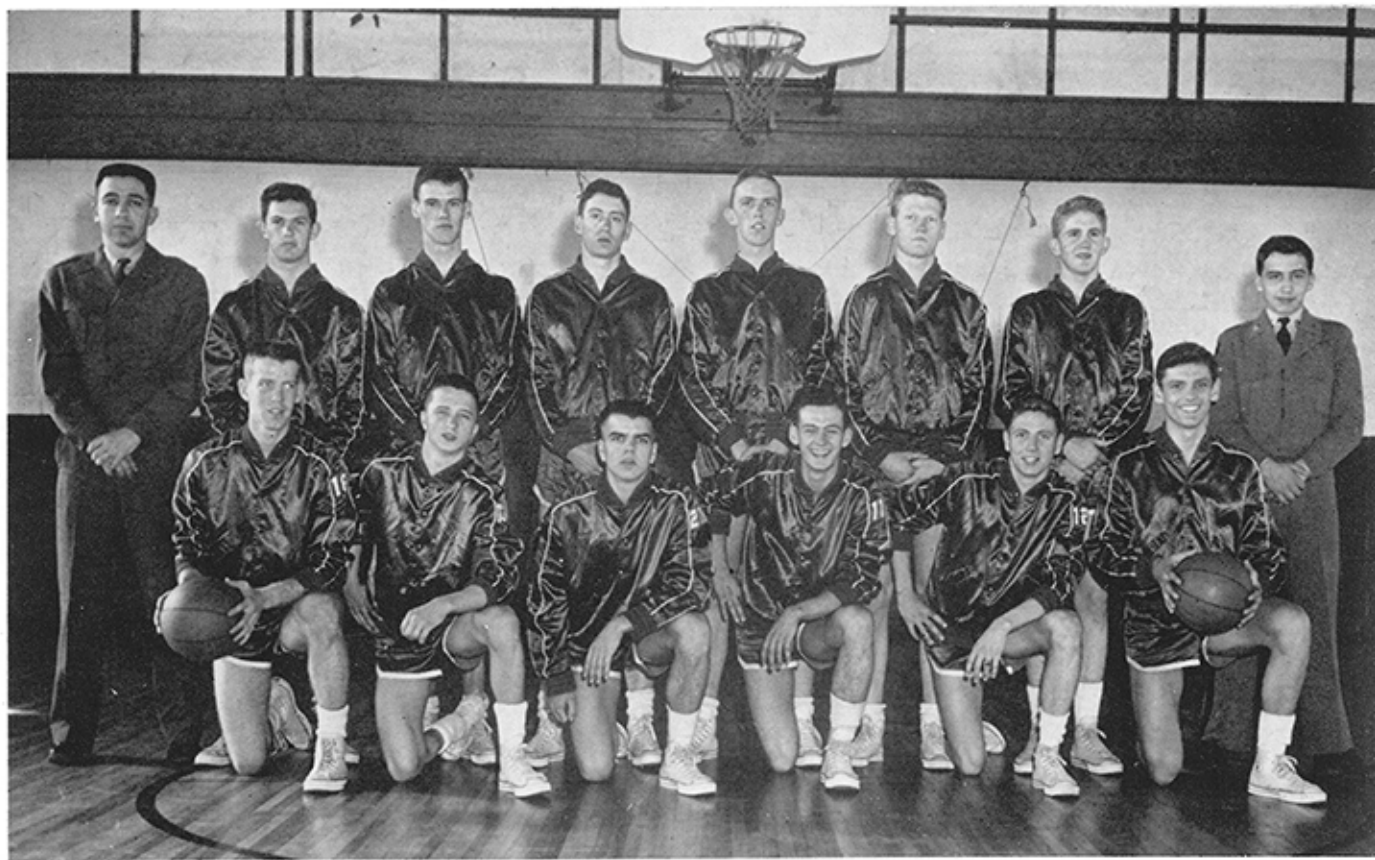
Next year's outlook is excellent since all but three lettermen are returning. Wrestling is a comparatively new sport here on the campus, but it will soon rival the major sports in popularity.

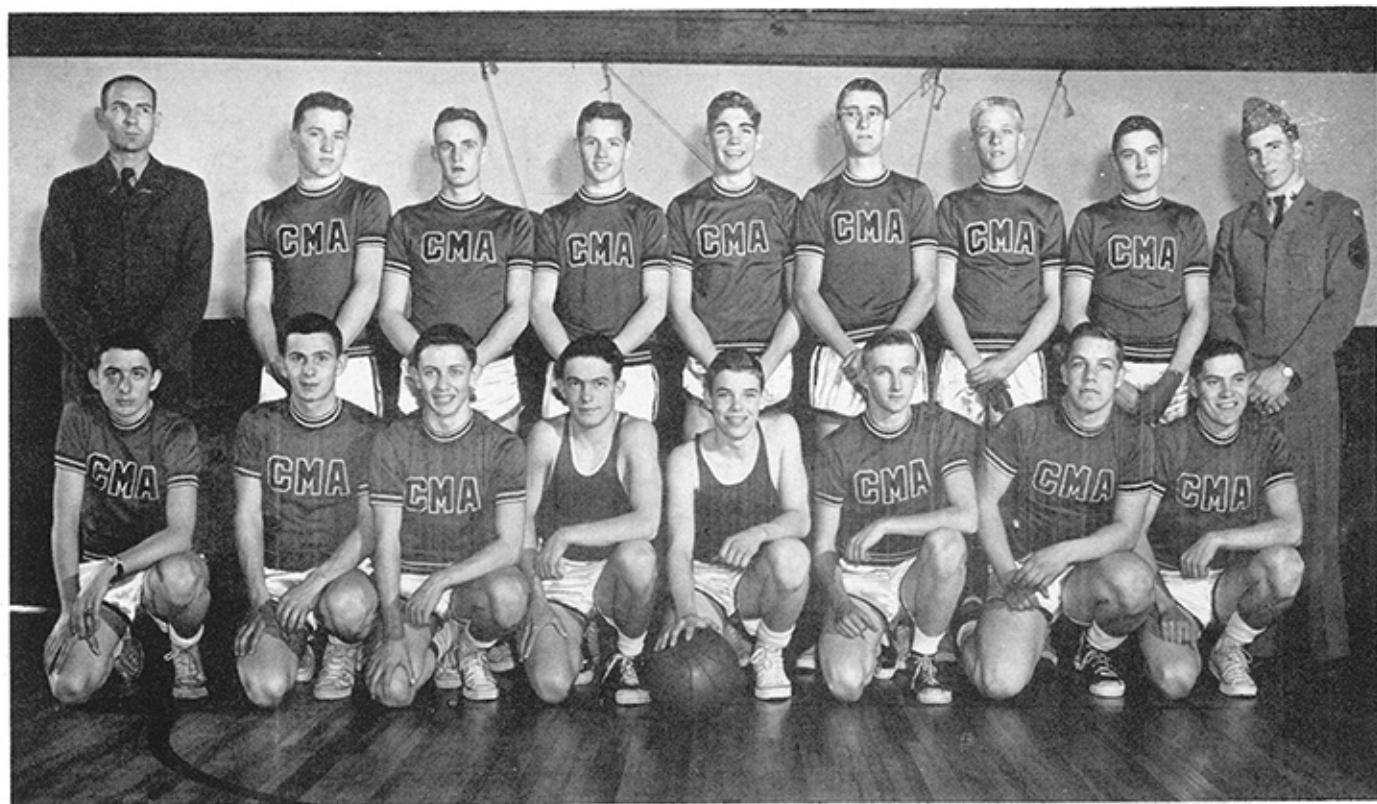
