




COL. JOHN B. THOMAS

DEDICATION



The yearbook this year is dedicated to the Columbia Military Academy Military Department composed of Major Jerry L. Isler, Master Sergeant Robert F. Allen (Ret.) and Sergeant First Class Donald Sorrell.

Major Isler entered the service in 1952 at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin for basic training. He served in Korea in '59 and '60 during which time he won Division NCO of the Month twice. In 1963 he was selected for Infantry OCS at Fort Benning, Georgia. He graduated as an honor graduate in 1964. In March of 1967 he became a Vietnam Battalion Advisor and later a Regimental Advisor. He was the only Captain ever to hold that position. In 1970, he was assigned duty at the 5th U.S. Army NCO Academy filling a Lt. Colonel's position as Captain. In 1973, Major Isler came to CMA as Senior Army Instructor.

Major Isler has received several awards which include the Vietnam Medal of Honor, 4 Army Commendation Medals, 5 Bronze Stars (3 for valor and 2 for meritorious service), the Combat Infantry Badge, and the Master Parachute Badge both American and Vietnamese.

MSG Allen is the military property custodian at CMA. He retired from the Army in September, 1961. He has been at CMA ever since as an ROTC instructor. While on active duty MSG Allen served in the Philippines, Panama, Alaska, Germany, Japan, and Korea. During his service MSG Allen was awarded the Bronze Star medal with Valor Device, Purple Heart with Oak Leaf Cluster, Asiatic Pacific Campaign Ribbon with 3 Arrowheads, and 5 Stars and a Philippine Presidential Citation.

Sergeant First Class Sorrell came to CMA in 1970 and has served since then as a military in-







structor and coach of the Rifle Team. His tours of duty have taken him to places like Korea, Germany, Texas, and Tampa, Florida, where he was an ROTC Instructor from 1967 to 1969. In 1969 he was a Field First Sergeant in Vietnam. Here at CMA, Sgt. Sorrell has coached the Rifle Team from an average score of 850 to a team aggregate average of 1000 this year. Also known as FM 22-5 Sorrell, Sgt. Sorrell has won the Air Medal, Army Commendation Medal, Bronze Star for both meritorious service and valor, and the Expert Infantry Badge.





















PRESIDENT AND HEADMASTER


WRESTLING





Mr. CMA is the model of what all cadets should strive to be. He is what would make this school perfect, were everyone like him.






